Most Significant Accomplishments, 1999**

- **Increased international enrollments to record levels again. (*Learning—Expanding international dimensions*)**
We exceeded our goal of maintaining international student enrollments at 1998 levels despite large cohort of graduating students from Malaysia. Nonimmigrant student enrollment increased 2.4%, from 592 (Fall 98) to 606 (Fall 99). Immigrant student enrollment increased 1.1%, from 625 (Fall 98) to 632 (Fall 99).
- **Improved and expanded international admissions process. (*Accountability and Best Practices*)**
- Reduced time between receipt and acceptance/denial of application by 50% during Fall Semester 1999.
- Increased yield rate. New international enrollment up 38 (+30%) for Fall Semester 1999.
- Added additional credential analyst and data entry person.
- Revamped filing system (in progress)
- **Increased number of IUPUI students having international experiences. (*Learning – Expanding international dimensions*)**
- Increased number of IUPUI students earning credit abroad 16.5%, from 121 in 1998 to 141 in 1999, surpassing the 5% goal. This includes undergraduate, graduate, and professional school students.
- Increased number of students applying for a Christel DeHaan Family Foundation Scholarship for International Studies from 32 to 39. A total of 21 awards were made.
- Developed new opportunities for IUPUI students to gain service learning experience through the Christel DeHaan Family Foundation at the Christel House Learning Center in Mexico City. The CDFF Foundation is providing additional stipends. The first students will travel to Mexico in the spring of 2000.
- Assisted faculty in three different schools in preparing proposals for the Overseas Study Advisory Committee of Indiana University. Three new programs were approved: in Greece, Nicaragua and also human rights internships in various countries.
- Expanded the internship exchange program between IUPUI and the Berufsakademie Mannheim, Germany to include faculty exchanges and joint course developments with the Purdue School of Engineering and Technology.
- **Worked with Schools and other university units to implement the IUPUI International Mission and Goals (*Accountability and Best Practices*)**
- Achieved approval of plan through Council of Deans, Faculty Council Committees and Campus Town Meeting
- Put new funding mechanism based on service to units in place.
- Established and filled position for International Recruitment/Retention Officer.
- Began development of recruitment plan and funding plan for recruitment as defined in the Mission Statement
- Worked with Schools of Nursing and Liberal Arts to develop their own international mission statement and goals in accordance with campus plan
- **Continued excellence in service. (*Collaboration, Accountability and Best Practices*)**
- Continued development of OIA's well-received, extensive website.
- Maintained managed technology plan and increased number of higher level computers available.
- Provided expertise and assistance to campus and community groups that reinforce the international mission of IUPUI, e.g., Indiana Humanities council program on Germany.
- International House and International Club collaborated with the Office of Campus Interrelations in numerous programming ventures. I-House continues to be a successful living-learning center operating at full capacity.
