13. Partnerships Established By Research Centers

Through the Center for Urban Policy and the Environment—(1) Three faculty from Purdue participated in work for Indiana Gambling Impact Study Commission; (2) two other professionals also participated in this project: Loreen Ruggle, Trimeridian Corporation, and Henry Lesieur, President, Institute for Problem Gambling; (3) Professor James Perry has played a large role in the evaluation of CDC capacity building for INHP; (4) the Center joined with the Center on Philanthropy in sponsoring the Institute for the Study of Government and the

Nonprofit Sector; (5) The Center also supported development of a proposal by the Center on Philanthropy on community foundations funded by the Lilly Endowment and SPEA faculty and staff may perform various roles in that project; (6) Professor Greg Lindsey, Associate Director for Environmental Programs in the Center participates with CEES (School of Science).

The Bowen Center remains an on-going set of research partnerships between faculty from the School of Public and Environmental Affairs and the Department of Family Practice Medicine.
